Hours are 8am to 7:30pm approximately


Sat & Sun Hours: 11am-7:30pm

The culverts under your driveway are YOUR responsibility to keep cleaned out of all debris. Please clear them so the rain water will flow in the proper direction.

Have a shut off put on your house so that the water department doesn't have to come out.

94.1.022 What is Refuse collections? The following is, but not limited to, a list of refuse collections that are not acceptable in the Pines;

- 1) Food garbage or leftover food articles or containers, bagged or not bagged left outdoors. Due to certain health concerns, owners will be sent a certified letter stating they have one week to dispose of or store garbage in proper garbage containers (not plastic bags). If the owner/tenant fails to comply, a fine will be assessed. The fine may be appealed to the Adjudication Committee.
- 2) Broken household furniture and appliances left outdoors or stored on patios and decks.
- 3) Stacks of scrap lumber piled in a state of disarray* and uncovered.
- 4) Empty pallets stacked in disarray*
- 5) Burned, partially burned or unburned tree limbs and stumps piled in a state of disarray*.
- 6) Outdoor yard tools left in yards or driveways until they are rusty or overgrown with grass or weeds.
- 7) Scrap iron or old rusted metal machinery or parts thereof.

As summer approaches, you may have plans to start construction and landscaping projects. Your friends at Puget Sound Energy want to remind you about the importance of calling 811 at least two business days prior to any digging. It is the law, and utility-owned lines are located for free.

Whether you are planning to use your employees or hire a contractor, smart digging means calling 811 before each job. Outline your dig area in white paint so that the utilities will know where to mark. Even homeowners digging on their on property must call, if digging deeper than 12 inches.

Don't take a chance. Call 811 before you dig, then dig by hand within 2 feet of the markings.

Emergency Supplies

Government agencies will respond to community disasters, but citizens may be on their own for hours, even days, after disaster strikes. You should be prepared to take care of yourself and your family for at least three days. In some emergencies, such as an influenza pandemic, you may need to prepare for a week or months.

Emergency survival kit

Store a kit at home, at work and at each child's school or daycare facility.

- Dry or canned food and drinking water for each person
- Can opener
- First aid supplies and first aid book
- · Copies of important documents such as birth certificates, licenses, and insurance policies
- "Special needs" items for family members such as infant formula, eyeglasses and medications
- A change of clothing
- Sleeping bag or blanket
- Battery powered radio or television
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- Whistle
- Waterproof matches
- Toys, books, puzzles, games
- Extra house keys and car keys
- List of contact names and phone numbers
- Food, water and supplies for pets

Additional items you can store at home for use during an emergency:

Cooking supplies

- Barbecue, camp stove
- Fuel for cooking, such as charcoal or camp stove fuel
- Plastic knives, forks, spoons

- Paper plates and cups
- Paper towels
- · Heavy-duty aluminum foil

Sanitation supplies

- Large plastic trash bags for trash, water protection
- Large trash cans
- Bar soap and liquid detergent
- Shampoo
- Toothpaste and toothbrushes
- Feminine and infant supplies
- Toilet paper
- Household bleach with no additives, and eyedropper (for purifying drinking water)
- Newspaper to wrap garbage and waste

Comfort

- Sturdy shoes
- Gloves for clearing debris
- Tent

Tools

- Ax, shovel, broom
- Crescent wrench for turning off gas
- Screwdriver, pliers, hammer
- Coil of one-half inch rope
- Plastic tape and sheeting
- Knife or razor blades
- Garden hose for siphoning and fire fighting
