Hello Nisqually Pines Members,

Hoping your summer is getting off to a perfect start! I want to thank everyone who took the time to vote in our recent ballot election. We mailed out 673 ballots to the home owners of our community and we received 140 back to be counted. *Thank you everyone who voted.*

With the help of the sheriff, a concerned parent and our office staff we were able to catch the criminals that broke into the pool area, stole some personal items and painted graffiti on the walls of the clubhouse pool walls. Restitution for the re-painting and stolen items is in process.

The budget is due for your vote in August; this will include suggestions for long range plan funds. If you would like any information regarding the upcoming budget please let the office know. When the final draft is completed it will be mailed out to every home owner.

The board will be considering ideas for the long range plan funds. If you have a suggestion or ideas that would help maintain or add to our community assets please let us know. Members/home owners are welcome to stop by the office with a written idea or come to the board meeting on July 10th at 6:30PM. We will be discussing your suggestions and our ideas for the ballot in August. As far as next year's budget, there are no plans of raising anyones dues. One of our water loans is almost paid off and that amount will be subtracted from your dues after the loan payment is complete around ~~November 2020~~

On a personal note, I am home recovering from ankle surgery, I am missing my "senior swim" friends at the pool. Hope the rest of you are enjoying the pool. (I know more sun would help!)

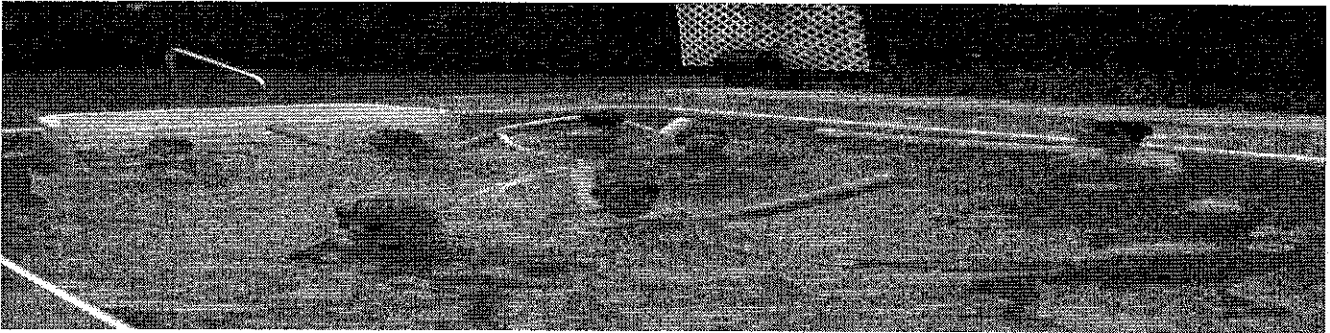

GREENBELTS AND COMMON AREAS

The greenbelts are to remain in their natural state. They are a buffer between neighbors and clubhouse area to help keep the noise level down.

Our maintenance men have been cleaning up the greenbelts and we have found things that are not to be in there.

The greenbelts and common areas are not your personal garbage can. There is to be no dumping of yard debris, grass clippings, tires, aerosol cans, glass bottles, milk jugs, car parts, partially burned mini blinds, wire fencing, toys, furniture, chandeliers, bondo for cars, aluminum cans, seats to vehicles, household garbage, shoes, socks, etc.

Here are a few pictures of items that I have found and started cleaning up.

If you have been using the greenbelts for a dumping ground then you need to get it cleaned up before I come and find it and send you a warning letter that can turn into a fine.

This is where we live and it is our responsibility to keep clean.

If you are a dog owner, or know someone who owns a dog, please inform them it is a violation within the Pine's and Thurston County to let dog (s) run loose outside unattended. There is a county wide leash law which applies to the Pine's. If your dog (s) is an inside dog and you let it out to relieve itself, please keep it confined to your own yard.

There are many residents who like to go for walks and do not appreciate fending off dogs. Nor do they like to clean up "presents" left behind by wandering dogs or step in it. YUK. Please consider your neighbors. Thank you for being a considerate pet owner.

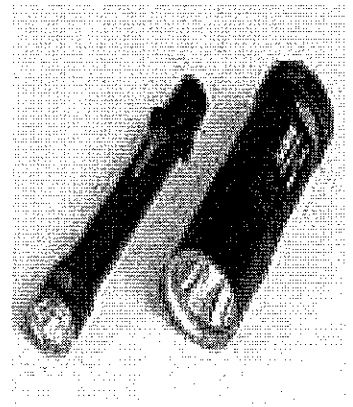
20 grass that needs mowed

94.1A.018 What will happen if uncontrolled weeds, vegetation, and dry grass not maintained and become a fire hazard? During the summer months when it is hot and dry and the fire danger is high, grass and vegetation that is not maintained and over fifteen (15) inches tall and is dry and brown in color and easily combustible will not be permitted. The following will occur;

- (1) Owners of property with such grass and vegetation will be sent a certified letter advising of the grass and immediate fire hazard.
- (2) They will be advised that the grass must be cut and removed within ten (10) days of the date of the letter.
- (3) They will be given a list of names of persons who will cut and remove the grass for a reasonable fee.
- (4) If the property is occupied and the owner does not comply, they will automatically be fined and it will be added to their account.
- (5) If the property is vacant the Pines will hire a contractor to cut and remove the grass or vegetation, all costs will be assessed against the property owner. This includes any legal fees or costs associated with having law enforcement (Thurston County Sheriff), if necessary, at the time of removal.

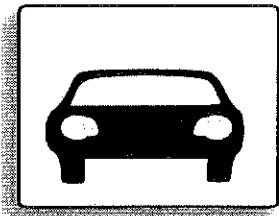
Please watch for children and parent's please remind your children to watch for cars and not to block Roadways. Please slow down and watch for Walkers/Joggers/Bikers

Bicycle riders— please make sure your reflectors work or you have a light so you are more visible.



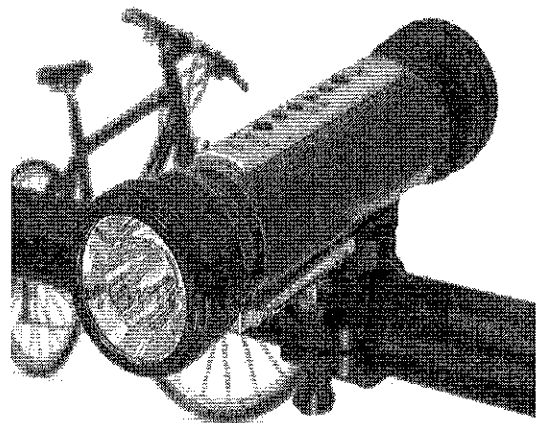
Car Owners— Check your front headlights, rear taillights and brake lights to make sure that they are in working condition.

Call 811 Before You Dig

As winter/spring approaches, you may have plans to start construction and landscaping projects. Your friends at Puget Sound Energy want to remind you about the importance of calling 811 at least two business days prior to any digging. It is the law, and utility-owned lines are located for free.

Whether you are planning to use your employees or hire a contractor, start digging means calling 811 before each job. Outline your dig area in white paint so that the utilities will know where to mark. Even homeowners digging on their own property must call, if digging deeper than 12 inches.

Don't take a chance. Call 811 before you dig, then dig by hand within 2 feet of the markings.

Reminder for July 1, 2019 – Start of new agency year at the Yelm Community Services Food Bank

Yelm Community Services provides food bank services for people who live within the zip codes for Yelm (98597), Rainier (98576), and for all zip codes from the Olympia or Roy areas that lie within the Yelm School District.

This is a reminder that July 1, 2019 marks the start of the new fiscal year for Yelm Community Services. This means that on or before July 1, 2019, each household needs to submit the following for each person in their household:

- 1) I.D. showing name, address and Date of Birth,
- 2) If the I.D. does not show the current address, then another document that does show the current address is acceptable, such as a utility bill, property tax notice, and the like,
- 3) For underage youth, a copy of a medical coupon or other official correspondence (DSHS, military, and like, Social Security (a letter from Social Security to the person, but not required to show social security card, because we don't require the SSN), is acceptable proof of existence and same address.

Please note that you can only claim for people living in your household, not those who are visiting or who you have as guests for dinner, or the like. You can only claim for underage children for whom you have custody.

If you are homeless, you still need to present your current I.D. and some correspondence that shows where you receive your mail and/or where you stay at night.

Please note: If you do not live within the service delivery area of Yelm Community Services, then you will be directed to the food bank that serves your area.

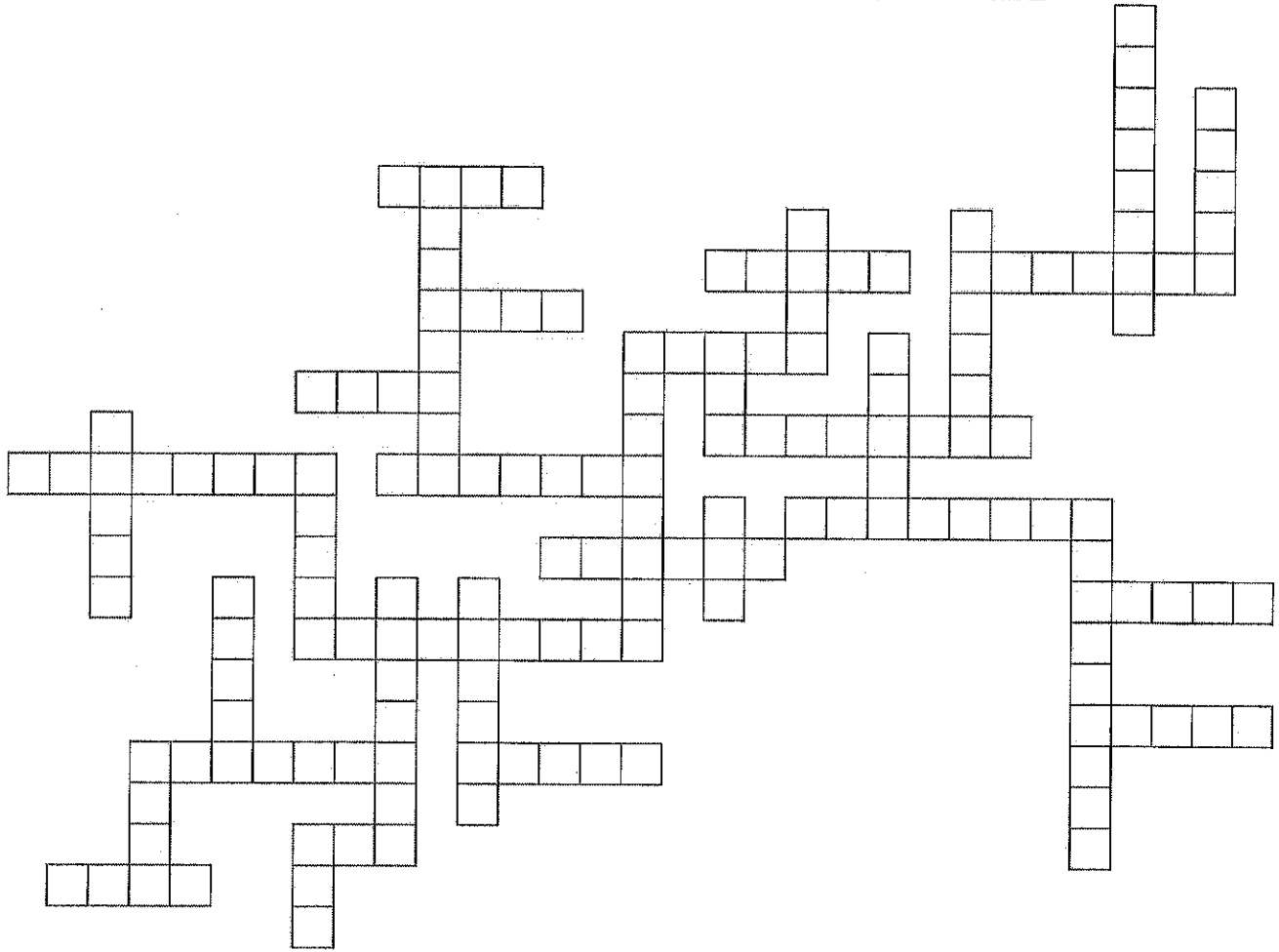

Air quality and fire safety burn ban information for Washington state

Residential Burn Ban in Effect July 15 – October 1 in Thurston County

Outdoor burning of residential materials in Thurston County is prohibited July 15 through October 1. This seasonal prohibition, crafted by the Thurston County Residential Outdoor Burning Committee, has been in effect for many years. The Committee includes representatives from Thurston County, the state Department of Natural Resources (DNR), local fire agencies and Olympic Region Clean Air Agency (ORCAA).

Outdoor burning is prohibited year-round for residents within the cities of Olympia, Tumwater and Lacey, as well as for county residents within the Urban Growth Area (UGA) boundary. At this time, recreational fires are not affected by the seasonal curtailment. Recreational fires are fires used for entertainment or cooking purposes and are made of either charcoal or seasoned firewood. They can be no larger than 3 feet diameter.

The restrictions on outdoor burning during the summer and early autumn has resulted in a significant drop in brush fires and property damage each of the past couple years, according to fire officials.

“Safety stands as the most important consideration here,” said Dan Nelson, spokesman for ORCAA. “Also, as the restrictions have greatly reduced the number of escaped brush fires in the county each year, there has been a reduction in big smoke events as well.”

Fortunately, safe and effective alternatives to burning exist. Residents have several options for disposing of their yard waste. These include the following:

- **Composting:** Maintaining a home compost pile provides you with a ready source of rich soil additives that will get rid of your yard waste while reducing (or eliminating) your need for expensive fertilizers. Use the natural compost as a soil additive in your gardens to keep your flowers bright, and your vegetables plump and tasty.
- **Chipping/Grinding:** Bigger, woody debris may be too large for the compost bin. That’s where a chipper comes in. Rent one yourself, or get together with your neighbors to do a neighborhood chipping party. Wood chips can be composted, or used as ground cover around open flower beds (to supplement or replace expensive beauty bark).

- **County-Wide Curbside Organics Bin**, Offered through LeMay, www.lemayinc.com (<http://www.lemayinc.com/>). Curbside organics/yard waste service is available in virtually all areas of Thurston County. To sign up for service and have a bin delivered to your home, call LeMay Enterprises at (360) 923-0111. If you live in the City of Olympia, call (360) 753-8368, option 1. (Yard waste bins are now called "organics" bins.)
