Beef & Shredded Chicken Taco Bar will be provided along with hard and soft taco shells, salsa, cheese, olives, sour cream, lettuce and tomato.

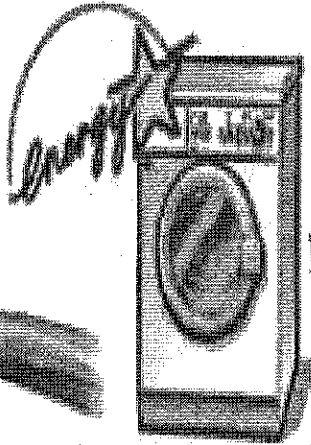
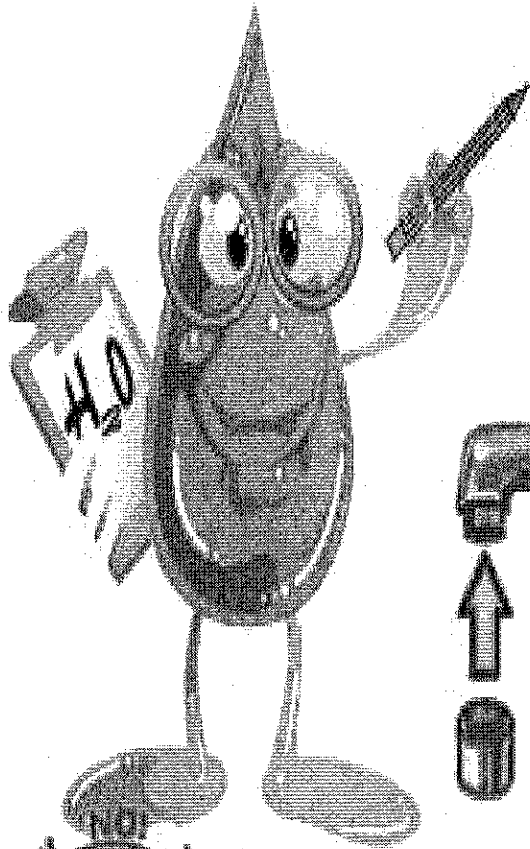

Wise Water Use



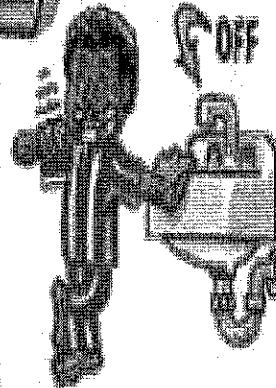
Get an Energy Star labeled washing machine. Wash only full loads.



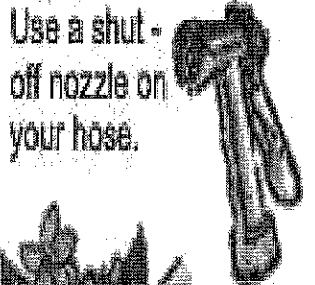
Use low flow showerhead.

Turn off the water while soaping hands and brushing teeth.



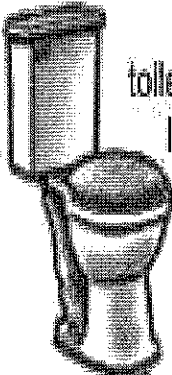
Use a shut-off nozzle on your hose.



Mulch around plants to hold water in the soil.

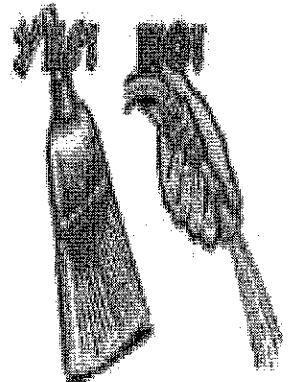


Water your yard and outdoor plants early or late in the day to reduce evaporation.

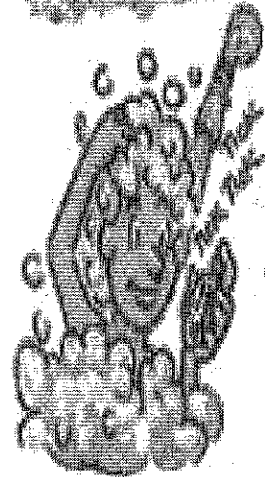


Install new toilets that use less than 1.6 gallons per flush.

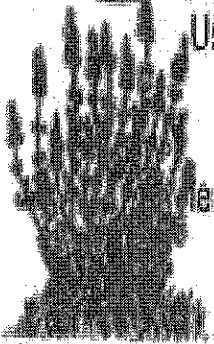
Turn off sink faucet while scrubbing dishes and pots.

ATTENTION DOG OWNERS:

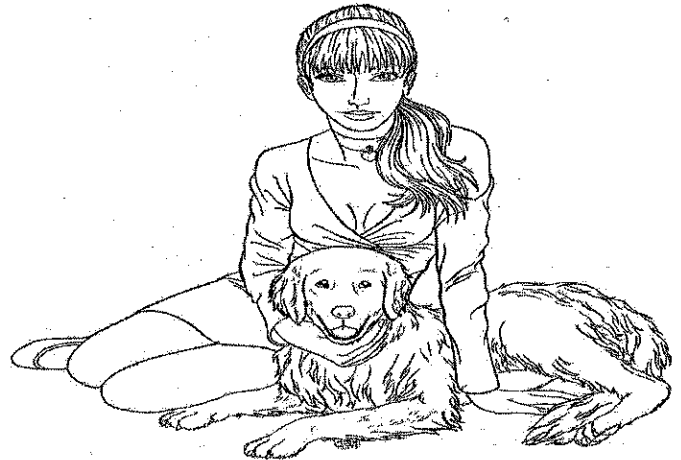

94.1.075 What property development activities are prohibited in the Pines? No person, owner, tenant, contractor, or developer within the legal boundaries of Nisqually Pines Community Club who owns or is developing or changing the landscaping of property within the Pines shall not:

(1) General

(a) Have more than one single family dwelling on each legally platted lot;

1st offence: \$1000 2nd offence: \$2500 3rd offence: \$5000 4th offence: \$1000

Once I find someone living in a trailer, 5th wheel or RV a warning letter will be sent then if it is not corrected a fine will be sent.

Paragraph (3) Section C- Burning any garbage or toxic items;;

1st offence: \$250 2nd offence: \$300 3rd offence: \$500 4th offence: \$1000

Please remember that household furniture and garbage are not to be burned. It's a warning letter and then a fine. Also you could get a large fine from ORCCA.

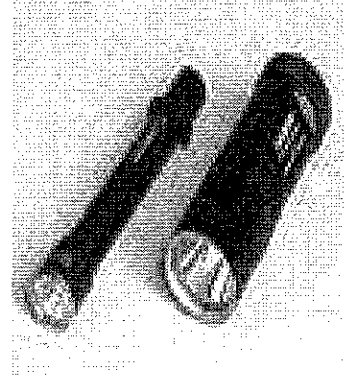

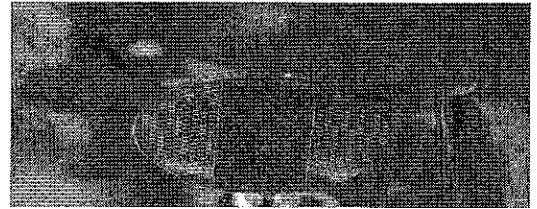
SUMMERTIME

As summer approaches, you may have plans to start construction and landscaping projects. Your friends at Puget Sound Energy want to remind you about the importance of calling 811 at least two business days prior to any digging. It is the law, and utility-owned lines are located for free.

Whether you are planning to use your employees or hire a contractor, smart digging means calling 811 before each job. Outline your dig area in white paint so that the utilities will know where to mark. Even homeowners digging on their own property must call, if digging deeper than 12 inches.

Don't take a chance. Call 811 before you dig, then dig by hand within 2 feet of the markings.

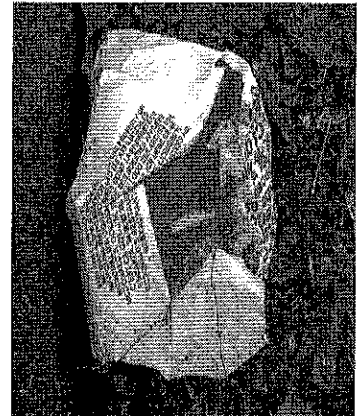

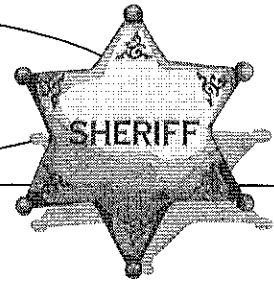

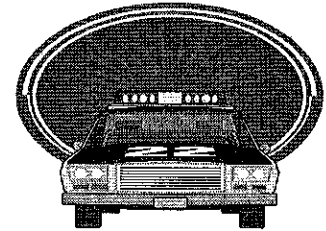

Is my water safe?

We are pleased to present this year's Annual Water Quality Report (Consumer Confidence Report) as required by the Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA). This report is designed to provide details about where your water comes from, what it contains, and how it compares to standards set by regulatory agencies. This report is a snapshot of last year's water quality. We are committed to providing you with information because informed customers are our best allies.

Do I need to take special precautions?

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/Centers for Disease Control (CDC) guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by *Cryptosporidium* and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Water Drinking Hotline (800-426-4791).

Where does my water come from?

Your water comes from 3 ground wells located between Pepperidge Ln and Port Oxford Blvd, where the Bonneville power corridor runs overhead. The wells draw from an old Tertiary and Quaternary aquifers that run through this area. The 2 larger wells draw from the Tertiary which is high in Iron and Manganese. These 2 wells pump to a filtration building, where chlorine is injected at inlet of each wells piping, there the chlorine binds with particles to stay in the filter beds till flushing, while the clean water pumps to the storage tanks.

As you may have heard we have been having problems with well #4. It no longer will be a source for water. Which means Nisqually Pines is running on only 2 wells.

Its important that we have another well drilled to accommodate this community. So until the new well #7 is completed and supplying the water we need please do your best to conserve. All residents have to do there part to not over use the other 2 wells right now. This community cannot run on only 1 well. Please use the community pool.

Source water assessment and its availability

Water Conservation Tips

Did you know that the average U.S. household uses approximately 400 gallons of water per day or 100 gallons per person per day? Luckily, there are many low-cost and no-cost ways to conserve water. Small changes can make a big difference - try one today and soon it will become second nature.

- Take short showers - a 5 minute shower uses 4 to 5 gallons of water compared to up to 50 gallons for a bath.
- Shut off water while brushing your teeth, washing your hair and shaving and save up to 500 gallons a month.
- Use a water-efficient showerhead. They're inexpensive, easy to install, and can save you up to 750 gallons a month.
- Run your clothes washer and dishwasher only when they are full. You can save up to 1,000 gallons a month.
- Water plants **only** when necessary.
- Fix leaky toilets and faucets. Faucet washers are inexpensive and take only a few minutes to replace. To check your toilet for a leak, place a few drops of food coloring in the tank and wait. If it seeps into the toilet bowl without flushing, you have a leak. Fixing it or replacing it with a new, more efficient model can save up to 1,000 gallons a month.
- Adjust sprinklers so only your lawn is watered. Apply water only as fast as the soil can absorb it and during the cooler parts of the day to reduce evaporation.
- Teach your kids about water conservation to ensure a future generation that uses water wisely. Make it a family effort to reduce next month's water bill!

Cross Connection Control Survey

A cross connection is an unprotected or improper connection to a public water distribution system that may cause contamination or pollution to enter the system. We are responsible for enforcing cross-connection control regulations and insuring that no contaminants can, under any flow conditions, enter the distribution system. If you have any of the devices listed below please contact us so that we can discuss the issue, and if needed, survey your connection and assist you in isolating it if that is necessary.

- Underground lawn sprinkler system
- Pool or hot tub (whirlpool tubs not included)
- Additional source(s) of water on the property
- Decorative pond
- Watering trough

Pool/ Clubhouse – Paulette Howard has been cleaning the pool and getting it ready for opening on Memorial Weekend.




Cert- The board approved premade signs for CERT to give to the community in the event there is an emergency. The office will order these supplies. They were also approved on getting a few other items in the budget.

What to Do Right After a Disaster

- 1. Check yourself and your loved ones for injuries.** The number one injury is cut feet from walking on broken glass: see the next item.
- 2. Protect your head, feet, and hands.** A bicycle helmet or hard hat protects from falling debris. Sturdy shoes protect from broken glass. Leather gloves protect from sharp objects. **All should be stored ahead of time under each person's bed with a flashlight.**
- 3. To prevent fire, check the natural gas or propane at your home.** If you smell a rotten egg smell, hear a hissing noise, or (for natural gas) see the meter dials spinning fast, open a window and quickly leave the building. Turn off the gas at the outside main valve, where the pipe comes out of the ground, by turning it ¼ turn in either direction – a NON-SPARK cast aluminum adjustable wrench works well. If possible, call the gas company from outside your house or at a neighbor's home. For propane, turn off the valve on top of the tank, turning it to the right until it's completely closed. **NEVER turn the gas or propane back on. To avoid dangerous leaks, it must be turned back on by the gas company or a certified plumber.**
- 4. If there is a small, contained fire, use your fire extinguisher.** (PASS: Pull the pin, Aim the hose at the base of the fire, Squeeze the handle, and Sweep from side to side of the fire.) **If the fire is too big to put out with one fire extinguisher, quickly evacuate and call 911 from a neighbor's house or cell phone.**
- 5. Look for electrical system damage if you can.** If you see sparks or broken or frayed wires, or if you smell hot insulation, turn off the electricity at the main fuse box or circuit breaker. **Do not step in water to get to the fuse box or circuit breaker.** Shut off the individual circuits before shutting off the main circuit breaker.
- 6. If you are outside, stay away from downed power lines.** You can't tell by looking at them whether they are 'live' or not. **NEVER** try to move them. **NEVER** try to hop over them. Be sure to check overhead for power lines and other hanging items. **NEVER** walk under a power line that is resting on a tree branch or fallen tree.
- 7. Shut off water at the main house valve.** This traps water in your home and keeps pollutants out of possible drinking water. Likely locations for the house valve are under the house, near the water heater, the garage or near the fence line (**on your property and not the water meter box!**).
- 8. Place the Help or Okay sign on your front door or window.** Posting the sign will help the C.E.R.T. TEAMS locate those who need help first.
- 9. After all of the above Steps are completed, go to the Community clubhouse where you will be get updated on what's happening in our community.**
- 10. If you do not have the HELP/ OKAY sign, please go to the office and get it with no charge to you.**
