#### Save \$\$\$ on Litter Boxes

If you choose to burn your yard waste, and you live in an area where it is legal to do so, please follow these guidelines:

Check Permit Requirements for your area. For instance, all fires within Thurston County require permits. Do NOT use a burn barrel. Burn Barrels and other burn containers are illegal under state law and their use may result in fines.

Burn only natural vegetation from your own property. Trash burning is illegal and may result in fines of up to \$14,915.

Check the weather prior to starting your burn. Don't burn during air stagnation events nor in windy conditions.

Fires must be attended at all times and must be completely extinguished.

Do NOT create a nuisance. You are responsible for your fire. Creating smoke, odor and ash that unreasonable impacts neighboring properties is illegal.

94.1.075 What criminal activities are prohibited in The Pines? Criminal activities should be referred to either Thurston County Sheriff or Yelm Police Department for handling. Charge and conviction will be handled by the court system. The Pines may asses these fines in addition to the county. No person within the legal boundaries of Nisqually Pines Community Club shall:

(2) Breach the peace in the Pines in any way, including, but not limited to:

Whether you are planning to use your employees or hire a contractor, start digging means calling 811 before each job. Outline your dig area in white paint so that the utilities will know where to mark. Even homeowners digging on their on property must call, if digging deeper than 12 inches.

Don't take a chance. Call 811 before you dig, then dig by hand within 2 feet of the markings.

# Water Heater Flush - How to Flush a Gas or Electric Water Heater

Water heater manufacturers recommend flushing sediment from your storage type water heater periodically. How often your model needs to be flushed depends upon the quality of the water in your area. Areas with high mineral content will have to flush more often.

How to Flush Your Water Heater

CAUTION: When flushing your water heater there is danger of being scalded. Be careful and keep children and pets away during the procedure.

Water heater manufacturers recommend flushing sediment from your storage type water heater periodically. How often your model needs to be flushed depends upon the quality of the water in your area. Areas with high mineral content will have to flush more often.

What is sediment, and why is it a problem? The sediment is sand or other grit from a well, or any other material that has gotten into the municipal water mains. Sediment can also come into your home after the water company flushes out their lines.

Over time, your heater can accumulate this sediment consisting of sand, gravel, grit, and various mineral deposits. This buildup can reduce the amount your water heater holds, create a variety of interesting noises, and reduce the efficiency of your unit. The buildup of sediment at the bottom can harden and sometimes clog the drain valve.

Cleaning this sediment from out of your water heater is not particularly difficult; here is how to do it.

If your water heater is gas, set the gas valve to "Pilot" to prevent the burners from coming on while you are flushing it. If your heater is electric be sure to turn off the circuit breakers. With an electric water heater, if the water level drops below the heating elements and the thermostat turns the elements on, the heating elements will probably burn out quite rapidly.

Connect a garden hose to the drain valve at the bottom of the tank. Make sure the outlet of the hose is in a safe area away from pets and children. It can be very hot and can scald quickly

Close the shut off valve on the cold inlet to the water heater. Carefully open the temperature/pressure relief valve at the top of the tank by lifting the lever. Leave the valve open.

Open the drain value at the bottom of the heater allowing the water to flow out through the garden hose. If the sediment is clogging the drain value then try closing the

temperature/pressure relief valve and turn the cold inlet valve back on to "power flush" the sediment out.

In some cases the sediment hardens into large chunks that can block the drain valve. If so, then wait until everything cools down, remove the garden hose from the drain valve, remove the valve if necessary, and use a long screw driver to break up the clog. This is a very messy procedure.

When the garden hose runs clear you are finished.

Close the drain valve at the bottom of the tank and remove the garden hose.

Close the pressure relief valve at the top of the tank if it is still open, and turn the cold inlet valve back on.

Open a hot water faucet in your house, and let it run until no air bubbles come out.

Turn the heater back on, and with gas units re-light the pilot light if necessary.

# Save-Water and Energyby Showering Better





Your TV and video game system aren't the only things that need energy to keep going. It takes energy to bring water to your home and school. Energy is also needed to heat that water when used for showering and <u>han</u>d washing. But did you know that if you use less water for cleaning and playing, you'll save energy and protect the environment?

# Drops Need Watts

Water and energy work together. Have you ever picked up a gallon of water or milk from the fridge? It's pretty heavy, right? A lot of energy is used to carry every gallon of water you use from a drinking water source to a treatment plant that makes it safe to drink. After water leaves the treatment plant, more energy is needed to carry it through water pipes to your house. Imagine the journey it has taken—and just how tired you would be after carrying that much water all day!

And the work doesn't stop there. If you want that water to be hot, it takes energy to warm it up before it hits the tap. Here's some food for thought—the energy it takes to treat and deliver the water that just 10 houses use in a year could power your home's refrigerator for more than two years!

### Did You Know?

Water is also used to cool the power plants that generate the electricity we use every day. So every time your television, computer, or lights use energy, water is being used up too. In fact, it takes 3,000 to 6,000 gallons of water to power one light bulb left on 12 hours a day for a year. Turn out the lights and save both water and energy!

That's why it's so important not to waste water at home or school. Don't leave the water on when you brush your teeth. Make sure to turn off the faucet all the way after you wash your hands. If water drips from the faucet after you turn it off, it could be a leak. Tell an adult so it can be fixed. One of the best places to save both water and energy at home is in your shower. Besides taking shorter showers, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's WaterSense® program has some tips for how you and your family can "shower better."

## Showering Facts

The shower is a place where we can clean up, cool off, wake up, or relax after a long day. But it's also a place where we waste a lot of water and energy! Consider this:

- The average shower lasts eight minutes. Since a standard showerhead has a water flow of 2.2 gallons per minute, each shower uses 18 gallons of water!
- Across the United States, we use more than one trillion gallons of water each year just for showering.

Never fearl You and your family can still save water and energy. WaterSense has a special label for showerheads that use less water but still provide a great spray of water when you shower. If your family uses a WaterSense labeled showerhead:

- Every shower, you'll save enough electricity to power a 60-watt light bulb for eight hours.
- Every year, you'll save the amount of water it takes to wash more than 70 loads of laundry. That's a lot of dirty soccer jerseys!
