



The staff bagged over 200 bags of candy to hand out to the kids in our community.




Daylight Savings Time Sunday November 5th


Dumpster Days




ATTENTION DOG OWNERS



Mornings are staying dark as the middle & high schoolers walk to the bus stop.


Elementary children still have daylight as they wait for the bus. Let's remember to drive slow and watch for children on the street and at bus stops.

Tips from our Water Manager

Culverts:

The culverts under your driveway are YOUR responsibility to keep cleaned out of all debris, Please clear them so rain water will flow in the proper direction.

Gutters:

Time to clean out those gutters, so they won't overflow, wicking up the plywood on the roof causing rotting of the wood. Also make sure the water is running through the down spout to the ground.

Water Shut Offs:

In case of a water emergency, do you know where your water shut off to your house is? All houses should have a shut off of their own for their home. If you don't know where yours is, you may want to call a local plumber to install one. They can be put it in pretty easy right where your water line comes into the house. The meter box is Nisqually Pines shut off and should not be accessed by the homeowner.

Garbage Cans:

Your garbage service is on Tuesday, that means there should not be any garbage cans on the road or The Pines right-of-way on Wednesday.

Bicycle riders— please make sure your reflectors work or you have a light so you are more visible.






Car Owners- Check your front headlights, rear taillights and brake lights to make sure that they are in working condition.

PUGET SOUND ENERGY Call 811 Before You Dig

Fall has arrived and you may still have plans to start construction and landscaping projects. Your friends at Puget Sound Energy want to remind you about the importance of calling 811 at least two business days prior to any digging. It is the law, and utility-owned lines are located for free.

Whether you are planning to use your employees or hire a contractor, start digging means calling 811 before each job. Outline your dig area in white paint so that the utilities will know where to mark. Even homeowners digging on their on property must call, if digging deeper than 12 inches.

Don't take a chance. Call 811 before you dig, then dig by hand within 2 feet of the markings.



Water Heater Flush - How to Flush a Gas or Electric Water Heater

Water heater manufacturers recommend flushing sediment from your storage type water heater periodically. How often your model needs to be flushed depends upon the quality of the water in your area. Areas with high mineral content will have to flush more often.

How to Flush Your Water Heater

CAUTION: When flushing your water heater there is danger of being scalded. Be careful and keep children and pets away during the procedure.

Water heater manufacturers recommend flushing sediment from your storage type water heater periodically. How often your model needs to be flushed depends upon the quality of the water in your area. Areas with high mineral content will have to flush more often.

What is sediment, and why is it a problem? The sediment is sand or other grit from a well, or any other material that has gotten into the municipal water mains. Sediment can also come into your home after the water company flushes out their lines.

Over time, your heater can accumulate this sediment consisting of sand, gravel, grit, and various mineral deposits. This buildup can reduce the amount your water heater holds, create a variety of interesting noises, and reduce the efficiency of your unit. The buildup of sediment at the bottom can harden and sometimes clog the drain valve.

Cleaning this sediment from out of your water heater is not particularly difficult, here is how to do it.

If your water heater is gas, set the gas valve to "Pilot" to prevent the burners from coming on while you are flushing it. If your heater is electric be sure to turn off the circuit breakers. With an electric water heater, if the water level drops below the heating elements and the thermostat turns the elements on, the heating elements will probably burn out quite rapidly.

Connect a garden hose to the drain valve at the bottom of the tank. Make sure the outlet of the hose is in a safe area away from pets and children. It can be very hot and can scald quickly Close the shut off valve on the cold inlet to the water heater. Carefully open the temperature/pressure relief valve at the top of

the tank by lifting the lever. Leave the valve open.

Open the drain valve at the bottom of the heater allowing the water to flow out through the garden hose. If the sediment is clogging the drain valve then try closing the temperature/pressure relief valve and turn the cold inlet valve

temperature/pressure relief valve and turn the cold inlet valve back on to "power flush" the sediment out.

In some cases the sediment hardens into large chunks that can block the drain valve. If so, then wait until everything cools down, remove the garden hose from the drain valve, remove the valve if necessary, and use a long screw driver to break up the clog. This is a very messy procedure.

When the garden hose runs clear you are finished.

Close the drain valve at the bottom of the tank and remove the garden hose.

Close the pressure relief valve at the top of the tank if it is still open, and turn the cold inlet valve back on.

Open a hot water faucet in your house, and let it run until no air bubbles come out.

Turn the heater back on, and with gas units re-light the pilot light if necessary.
